E. Best Practices and Lessons Learned by the RRT (which may help other RRTs)

Understanding data collection and sharing process among the member agencies was identified as a need during the Spring 2018 meeting. A table top exercise (TTX) was designed to address this need. The TTX bore fruit within a month as we put to use the new relationships and increased understanding to enhance data exchange as member agencies responded to impacts from three tropical storm systems.

F. Federal, State, and Local Planning and Coordination Efforts

RRT 4 continued to dedicate meeting time to state and local concerns. Meetings in Alabama and Kentucky highlighted planning and coordination efforts involving our host communities. Local industry and response organizations actively participated in these meetings, sharing their knowledge, demonstrating their resources and developing relationships with the RRT 4 community. The RRT continued to provide concurrent training for state, tribal and local responders. The RRT coordinated the delivery of training programs specific to the needs of state and local responders throughout the region to include Inland SCAT classes and oil spill response.

The Spring 2018 RRT IV meeting in Mobile devoted significant time to a Hot-wash for activities related to Hurricane Irma response. Tribal preparedness and response, presentation and discussion lead by April Sells of the Poarch Band of Creek Indians. OSC Reports on an Anhydrous Ammonia barge fire, KC-130 response, planning topics included activities carried out by the Mobile Bay National Estuary Program and the Alabama Oil and Gas Board. A need for better coordination of data collection and sharing was identified.

The Fall 2018 RRT IV meeting was a joint meeting with RRT 5. The meeting was planning oriented with an emphasis on planning and response in the Ohio River area. We looked at the planning process of three sub-area plans. Presentations and discussions were led by local, state and federal personnel. Support of these efforts was demonstrated through the attendance of leadership from the Commonwealth of Kentucky to include the Lieutenant Governor and the Commissioner of Environmental Protection.

The State and Tribal Emergency Response Commission Representatives utilize meeting time on the first day. This has become an opportunity for training and relationship building. State Agencies have had an opportunity to learn from one another and develop stronger relationships with EPA EPCRA personnel.
